# June is Deafblind Awareness Month in Wisconsin

Celebrating Strength, Advocacy, and Inclusion in Our State

Governor Tony Evers has officially proclaimed June 2025 as Deafblind Awareness Month, recognizing the strength, resilience, and achievements of individuals who are deafblind across our state.

Deafblindness—a combination of vision and hearing loss—affects how individuals connect with the world and often requires specialized supports like interveners, interpreters, and Support Service Providers (SSPs). These services help ensure full access to education, community life, and meaningful relationships.

We also recognize the important work of the Wisconsin Deafblind Technical Assistance Project (WDBTAP), which supports children who are deafblind from birth through age 21 and plays a key role in empowering families and educators.

This month is an opportunity to raise awareness, promote inclusion, and honor the legacy of Helen Keller, a symbol of determination and advocacy.

Let's work together to build a more inclusive Wisconsin for everyone.

## New DPI Deafblind Resources Documents

Guidance on Disability Criteria and the Vital Role of School-Based Interveners

The Wisconsin Deafblind Technical Assistance Project (WDBTAP), in partnership with the Department of Public Instruction (DPI), has developed two new resources to help school teams and service providers better support students who are deafblind.

#### 1. Deafblind Disability Criteria – FAQ

This resource provides answers to frequently asked questions regarding the criteria for identifying students with deafblindness. It is designed to support educators and evaluation teams in understanding and applying the deafblind disability criteria.

#### 2. School Based Interveners

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's resource on school based interveners explains the essential role interveners play in supporting students who are deafblind. It covers what interveners do, the training they receive, and how they help students access learning, communication, and social interaction in the classroom.

We encourage you to explore these resources and share them with your child's educational team. They're designed to build understanding and promote stronger social interaction in school environments.

# Helen Keller Education Act and the Congressional Deafblind Caucus



Many children who are deafblind in this country are NOT receiving a Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). The Helen Keller Education Act will help alleviate this problem by recognizing the critical role that interveners play in providing access for children with deafblindness in educational settings. One of the key components of the act being advocated in recent legislative pushes, including through a <u>bipartisan Congressional</u> <u>DeafBlind Caucus</u>, is the formal recognition and funding of intervener services in educational settings.

#### Hands-On Strategies to Support the Whole Child Through Active Learning with Kirstyn Martino

WDBTAP is excited to host a two-day training on Active Learning this August 4th and 5th in Fond du Lac, WI! This in-person workshop is a great opportunity for anyone working with a child who is deafblind and at an early developmental level.

Led by Kristyn Martino, an Active Learning Specialist from the Penrickton Center for Blind Children, the train-

ing will focus on simple, effective ways to help children become more engaged and involved with their surroundings.

Participants will learn the foundations of Active Learning with topics such as active versus passive learning, using the dynamic learning circle, how Active Learning supports social-emotional learning development, and how to use assessment

Through guided conversations and peer support, parents will gain tools to feel more grounded, resilient, and supported, not just in their parenting journey, but as whole individuals. The group setting fosters connection and encouragement, helping families feel less alone and more empowered.
